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## The Priest's Corner

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### IT'S NOT A PROBLEM UNTIL IT'S MY PROBLEM

Ever since Adam and Eve got the boot from paradise (heaven-on-earth), it seems that the world has been going to hell in a handcart. The world has certainly not been all that heavenly for as long as anyone can remember: problems, problems and more problems. And for the moment it's not from where or whence the problems have arisen. Suffice it to say that problems are usually the result of one or two reasons: selfishness or dumb luck. Either we deliberately do that which will eventually – or immediately – cause us and others or are the result of being in the wrong place at the wrong time.

What matter are the problems that confront us now and not the reasons for them in the first place. For one of the main problems with problems is that we spent so much time trying to figure out what went wrong or why it went wrong or whom to blame that we never have the time or energy to deal with the problem itself, whatever the problem.

The other problem with problems is that it is not a problem until it is my problem: until it confronts me head on, until I can no longer avoid it, escape it or try to justify it. Until then the problem is someone else's problem. But once it is my problem, then I have no choice but to confront it, deal with it, try to solve or understand it, live with it.

And where do we confront these problems most especially? In our family. When a problem becomes a family problem, my family's problem (however we define *problem*), then it is now my problem. G. K. Chesterton once observed: "The common defense of the family is that, amid the stress and fickleness of life, it is peaceful, pleasant and at one. But there is another defense of the family, and to me evident: its defense is that the family is not peaceful and not pleasant and not one." In other words, it is full of problems. In other words, we have to work at it inside the family.

Philip Yancey: "It is safe to say that I have learned more about grace, forgiveness, diversity – and, yes, original sin – from my family than from all the theology books I have read...so troublesome issues like divorce and homosexuality [problems to some/many] take on a different cast when you confront them not in a state legislature [or a church gathering/convention] but in a family reunion."

It is also safe to say that when problems are confronted on a very personal basis, when they are family problems – and the church is a family, is it not? – then we can begin to see those "problems" from a personal perspective and begin to deal with them with compassion and understanding, something we are unlikely to do when the problems are someone else's.

We will never make earth heavenly, but we can make it a little less hellish. What we need to do is understand that every problem, is really a family problem, and thus, ours, and deal with it as best we can and not find an excuse why we should not.

## The Children's Corner



**I have a pair of sox** that just like this one that reads "You're not the boss of me." A friend gave them to me as a joke when I was having a hard time at work. But if you look closely, the girl on the sox is treading some deep water and maybe in trouble.

And what do my sox have to do with this week's gospel lesson? Well, think for a moment about the prodigal son. Prodigal means – spending money freely or wastefully, I used to think it just meant selfish, but it really means wasteful. But the prodigal son went to his father one day and said, "I don't want to live on a farm, and work hard all of my life, I want to have fun. Give me my inheritance NOW. Let me have fun NOW." And the father did. He divided all that he had and gave the younger son what he wanted.

And the younger son is full of "I wants". He basically wanted 3 things – 1) money; 2) adventure; and 3) to not have a boss. He didn't want his father or his older brother to tell him what to do. He didn't want the animals who needed to be fed and watched to control his hours. He wanted to do just what he wanted to do when he wanted to do it. He wanted to be his own boss. Follow his own rules. Not listen to anyone. He wanted to live a selfish life.

And he did.

He ran to the big city, and spent money freely, and didn't work. And he thought he made friends with all of the people he paid to be with him – to party with him.

Until his money ran out.

Then he found out that all of the people he thought were his friends were not really friends. That without money to buy them things, these so-called friends disappeared. He had to find work and because he wasn't skilled or trained or educated to work, he could only find a job that required no skills. Dirty, hard jobs. The job he found was to feed and clean pigs.

One day, he realized his father's slaves had a better life than he did. So, he decided to go home. And he must have practiced what to say on the long trip home. He was going to apologize. Then from a far way off, his father saw his son approaching. His father must have been waiting, watching, and hoping his son would return. The father flew off the porch, to greet his son. The father was so happy he said, "Let's have a feast and celebrate. For this son of mine was lost, but now is found."

Now, do you think the younger son is ready to follow some rules and accept that the rules apply to him too? And what about the older brother, the one who stayed and worked. He got jealous the father was throwing a party for his younger brother.

But what both brothers need to realize is they already live in the Kingdom of God. That God's rules are the rules we follow, that God is the boss of us. And if we follow God's rules – especially the number 1 rule to love each other – with JOY, then it is not like work at all.

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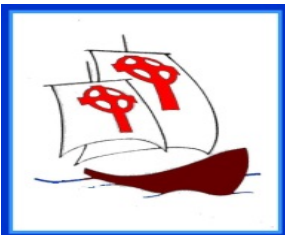
